Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time

How often do you come to Mass and ignore the Responsorial Psalm? I suspect the answer that many of you might give is that you would ignore the Responsorial Psalm most of the time. The Responsorial Psalm for today, however, is worth spending some time on. At least I think so.

O Praise the Lord all you nations. Acclaim him all you peoples.

This first verse of the psalm is an invitation to praise God. The invitation is not directed exclusively to Israel, but rather is universal in its extension. All nations and peoples are invited to praise God. Now this invitation makes a claim about God. The God who is to be praised is not only the God of Israel or of Judah or of the Christians or of some other exclusive group. The God who is to be praised is indeed Lord of all nations and all peoples.

This claim is also found in other psalms which proclaim the reign of God. They too are addressed to all the earth.

Strong is His love for us. He is faithful for ever.

The second verse of this shortest psalm gives the reason for this universal call to praise. Given the stories that we read in the opening chapters of the Book of Genesis, we might expect this universal call to praise to be grounded in the creative acts of God at the beginning of creation. However, a different reason is given for this call to praise God. Using language that reminds us of the time when God was revealed to Moses, the psalmist gives as the reason for this call to praise God. We praise God precisely because of God's steadfast and faithful love.

In the Book of Exodus, the Chosen People had turned away from the Lord and worshipped a golden calf. Following this apostasy of the golden calf, Moses pleads with the Lord to be shown the glory of the Lord. The Lord grants this request, and in the revelation of God to Moses which follows, God is described as abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness. Again and again, these two qualities of God are repeated together throughout the Psalter.

The psalmist's use of the same sort of language which is used in the Book of Exodus is important. For, by the time of the golden calf episode and the renewal of the covenant which follows, the fundamental identity of both humanity and of God is laid bare. Humanity – even the Chosen People – will turn away from the Covenant. They will turn away from God. God, on the other hand, abounds in steadfast love for sinful humanity and is supremely faithful. This is who God is. Faithful and loving. God cannot but love all nations and peoples, sinful as they may be.

By using the language of the Book of Exodus, the psalmist proclaims that the reason all nations and peoples should praise God is because God is faithfulness and love. Praising God for this faithfulness and love is the true vocation of humanity. Turning away from the covenant and asserting independence from God is not what humanity is called to do. All peoples and all nations are called to praise God precisely because God is faithfulness and love.

Strong is his love for us...In verse two of the Psalm, the Hebrew adjective used to describe the steadfast love of God – gabar – is translated as great. In Hebrew, this word is the word usually used to describe the strength of a military conqueror. But, its use in the context of this Psalm is not out of context. The sovereignty of God does indeed conquer all nations and peoples. But rather than military might, faithfulness and love are the weapons used by God in this new conquest of all nations and peoples.

The steadfast love and faithfulness of God reaches its highpoint in the person of Jesus Christ. And who is Jesus Christ for us? With the answer to this question, the whole enterprise of Christianity stands or falls.

In the Incarnation – the taking on of human flesh by the eternal Word of God – we "see our God made visible and so are caught up in love of the God we cannot see". But Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God is more than just the Son of God.

He is also Saviour. In Jesus Christ, Christians dare to profess that evil and betrayal have no more power. Sin and death are overcome. Forever. In Jesus Christ, we are able to proclaim the everlasting victory of God's steadfast and faithful love.

Psalm 117 also points us very readily to the end of all time. The psalmist's invitation for all nations and peoples to praise God points to a time when the boundaries of race and nation shall fade away and a single people will, with one voice, join in praising God. (cont)

Plenary Council 2020; next phase brings an invitation to meet (again?)

The Listening and Dialogue phase (finished Ash Wednesday 2019) led to the establishment of an overarching question and six "themes for discernment" as the Church in Australia prepares for the Plenary Council 2020. How is God calling us to be a Christ-centred Church that is

- missionary and evangelising?
- inclusive, participatory and synodal?
- prayerful and eucharistic?
- humble, healing and merciful?
- a joyful, hope-filled and servant community?
- open to conversion, renewal and reform

The national organising group tells us,

"Now that we are in the Discernment Phase, we continue to seek the wisdom of the Holy Spirit. We invite the groups who participated in Listening and Dialogue to now reconvene in communal Discernment on any **one** of the six themes. Each discernment session is expected to result in a submission that can be summarised in 1000 characters and that can be submitted through a form on the Discernment page (to be opened September 1). Our national Writing and Discernment Groups will then meet and discern on these submissions, with prayer and from their own theological knowledge, towards publishing thematic papers and fleshing out the agenda for the first session of the Plenary Council in October 2020. This period for group discernment and submissions will be open until the first few months of 2020."

If you wish to take part in the discernment process, please send (email or hard copy, "attn Gerard Hore") your name, phone number and which **one of the themes** you would like to focus on to the Parish Office (<u>office@sttheresas.org.au</u>). Please do this by **Wednesday 4 September**. There is no guarantee that every theme will see a group established in our parish but the more interest there is in a theme, the more chance of a group being established. Looking forward to hearing from many of you.

STATEMENT FROM ARCHBISHOP MARK COLERIDGE, PRESIDENT OF THE AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS CONFERENCE August 21, 2019



The Victorian Court of Appeal has today announced that, in a 2-1 decision, Cardinal George Pell's appeal against his convictions for child sexual abuse offences has been dismissed.

The Catholic Bishops of Australia believe all Australians must be equal under the law and accept today's judgement accordingly.

Cardinal Pell's legal team has said it will examine the judgement in order to determine a special leave application to the High Court.

The Bishops realise that this has been and remains a most difficult time for survivors of child sexual abuse and those who support them. We acknowledge the pain that those abused by clergy have experienced through the long process of the trials and appeal of Cardinal Pell. We also acknowledge that this judgement will be distressing to many people.

We remain committed to doing everything we can to bring healing to those who have suffered greatly and to ensuring that Catholic settings are the safest possible places for all people, but especially for children and vulnerable adults.

NEW GUIDELINES FOR CHURCH RESPONSE TO ABUSE

The ACBC has released a statement about the development of new national guidelines that will inform the way Church authorities, including dioceses, respond to contemporary and historical allegations about the abuse of children or vulnerable adults. The new guidelines will make the way Church entities respond to such concerns consistent, and will help create a more transparent and accountable culture in the way the Church responds. As the release explains, the new guidelines will be developed with reference to the new National Catholic Safeguarding Standards, which were launched in May.
