Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In some ways, Moses got a pretty raw deal from God. He only survived at birth because his mother sent him off in a basket when all other Hebrew boys were being thrown into the river to drown. Then, as a grown man, Moses has to flee after he murders an Egyptian who had mistreated one of the Hebrews. In the midst of his exile in Midian, Moses is called by God to lead his people out of slavery. And, we know of the problems he had doing that. Pharaoh would not listen. Pharaoh would not let the Israelites go free. And so, with "arm outstretched" and "mighty hand", the Lord delivers his people into freedom. Moses' task then is to lead these people into the promised land. Sounds easy, doesn't it? With the Lord having worked such marvels in their sight, it would be a delight to lead God's people to freedom.

Not for Moses. Instead of giving thanks to God for their deliverance from slavery, the Israelites apostatise. They make a golden calf and worship this idol as their god. And so Moses goes into bat for his people. This is what we hear in today's First Reading. Moses asking the Lord not to bring disaster on his people. Asking the Lord to forgive his peoples even though they had turned away from him. And, of course, "the Lord relented and did not bring on his people the disaster he had threatened."

The steadfast and faithful love of God is something that is celebrated in today's Gospel Reading. While there are three parables in today's Gospel Reading, it is the third of these parables that is the most famous. The parable of the lost sheep and the parable of the lost coin tend to be a bit forgotten when up against such company.

The parable of the Prodigal Son, or of the Forgiving Father, or of the Lost Son, would have to be one of the most famous of all the Gospel stories, and perhaps one of the most famous stories in the whole Bible. It is very familiar to us. And indeed, the Church keeps placing this story in front of us for good reason. Because this story is so familiar to us, again and again we are challenged to find some new meaning in this story for our lives as disciples.

Perhaps the titles which we give to this story will show how we understand it. By calling this story, the story of the Prodigal Son, it is easy to focus on the sinfulness of the younger son. How he took his share of the inheritance and wasted it on women, wine and song.

Sometimes, we refer to this parable as the story of the forgiving Father. By calling the story, the story of the Forgiving Father, we tend to focus on the love and mercy of the father in the story. And certainly there is love and mercy aplenty here. There is a line in the parable which is the key to this interpretation of the story. "while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with pity." The evangelist Luke does not tell us how long the younger son was away from home living his life of debauchery. It might have been years. But when the Son decides to return home, his father sees him while he is still a long way off. It seems to me that his father had been waiting for him to return. Perhaps the father had waited for years. How often, I wonder, had the father stood at the gates of his property and looked for his younger son to return? Every day? Every hour? We don't know. Here, I think we learn something of the richness and depth of God's love.

The author of Luke's Gospel places it in the fifteenth Chapter. Together with stories of a lost sheep and a lost coin. So we can also call this story, the story of the Lost Son. And it's easy to work out which son was lost, isn't it? It must be the younger son, the prodigal son. Or is it? *(cont)*

I just wonder whether it is the older son who is, in fact, the lost son. Because, of course, his younger brother is the son who is "found". He returns to his father and is embraced with love and clothed in the "best robe" of his father's mercy and forgiveness. As the father exclaims "he was lost and is found".

The older brother, on the other hand, resents the return of his younger brother. And, tantalizingly, we never learn whether this older brother comes around and can rejoice with his father that his younger brother returns home. Does he stay outside sulking, still refusing to go in and celebrate despite his father's pleading? Perhaps, just perhaps, it is the older brother who is in fact the lost son.

All of us, I suspect, at some stage in our lives, find ourselves in the position of each of the three major players in the third parable. Most of the time, we are the younger son: caught up in our sinfulness, "but leaving that place and returning to our father". Sometimes, we find ourselves like the father: waiting patiently and ever watchful for the return of one we love who has gone astray. But, I suspect all of us, if we are honest with ourselves, will sometimes also find ourselves like the older son. Sulking outside and refusing to come in and share the joy of our younger brother's return. Refusing to join the angels in their rejoicing over one repentant sinner.

When we do find ourselves like the older brother, I think we are then the lost son. But the invitation is always to "rise and return to our Father". To leave the place of our sinfulness, and find our rest in the forgiveness and love of God. There is no need for us ever to remain lost.
