Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Tekoa is a small town about twelve kilometres from Bethlehem. About 750 years before the time of Jesus, something happens to a sheep-farmer called Amos. While minding his sheep, he is called by God to leave his flocks and become a prophet. At this time, there were professional schools or groups of prophets. But Amos belongs to none of these: he is a shepherd. But God calls him. Directly and personally. Amos quickly finds that being God's prophet is not something he would chose for himself nor is it any part-time job. It becomes all consuming. As Amos says elsewhere: "The lion roars: who is not afraid? The Lord God has spoken: who will not prophesy?" (Amos 3:8)

The Northern Kingdom of Israel, to whom Amos is sent, was a kingdom of the "haves' and 'have-nots", a kingdom sharply and cruelly divided between the rich and the poor. God speaks to his people, through the voice of the prophet Amos. Like other prophets, Amos is not impressed by outwards shows of religious piety:

Spare me the din of your chanting,

Let me hear none of you strumming on lyres,

But let justice flow like water

And uprightness like a never-failing stream (Amos 5:23)

Amos confronts the vast concrete problem of social injustice. In today's First Reading, Amos attacks those who can't wait for the festivals to be finished so that they may go back to what they are really devoted to and that is exploiting those in need. Worship which just maintains the status quo is an affront to God. Worship which does nothing to address the situation of the poor in our midst is not worship at all. Worship, for Amos and for ourselves who gather to worship on Sundays, must cast a critical eye towards the world in which we live. Otherwise we are nothing more than a "gong booming or a symbol clashing." The best songs of praise are when the sounds of justice ring through the land.

Amos does not beat around the bush: he is no diplomat. He speaks plainly and simply like the countryman he is. He is a man of passion, through whom God has chosen to speak on behalf of the little ones who are exploited. Amos does more than just speak on their behalf: he seems to scream in protest and continues to call the people back to fidelity to the Covenant long after others have stilled their voice, settling for compromise and second best. Amos embodies the phrase that the one who does not love the brother and sister they can see; cannot possibly love the God they

The point made by Amos is made by another plain talking prophet born near Tekoa, in Bethlehem. Jesus has the same directness of speech: "You cannot be the slave both of God and of money." If money is your real treasure, then it is not likely that you will be able to deal appropriately with the true treasure of the Kingdom of God. We run the risk of getting our religious beliefs entangled and entwined with our wallets.

Jesus tells a parable in which the steward appears to be praised for his dishonesty with money. But it is not money that is the problem, it is the way the steward uses money. The dishonest steward uses his money to save his own skin. How much more should honest people use money to build up the Kingdom, to care for the poor in their midst, to stop others from getting hurt? It is not that we can buy our way into the Kingdom of God, we cannot. But our use of money must be in harmony with the values of the Kingdom.

Whenever God speaks to us in the pages of Sacred Scripture, a reminder about the poor and needy is never too far away. We cannot claim to be people of faith; we cannot claim to be interested in social justice without committing something of ourselves to addressing the wrongs we see around us. Our worship of God *must* influence the way we behave. Our worship of God has to influence our way of dealing with each other. We cannot love the God we cannot see if we do not first love the brother and sister we can see.
