GREETINGS FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST - BRIAN

I hope you are all well and coping with the COVID-19 restrictions. I would like to take this opportunity to give an update and appraisal of how current restrictions affect us as a Church. We are all aware of the Qld. Government's three stage directive (from May16-early August) regarding easing restrictions.



As we enter Stage 2 (4wks from 13 June) subject to the approval of our COVID Safe Plan, the Bishop has authorised

individual Baptisms with a maximum of 20 attending. Weddings are permitted allowing 20 people to attend. In regard to funerals, a maximum of 50 people are allowed to attend. At all services strict social distancing remains (except same family groups) and we will be maintaining all the requirements of our COVID Safe Plan.

There will be a significant change in the number allowed to attend when we enter Stage 3 (4wks from 11 July) where up to 100 people will be allowed to attend-Funerals, Weddings, and Worship and Religious Ceremonies.

As I am sure you can appreciate our prime concern is the welfare and safety of all. am also conscious that Government directives can also change on a regular basis depending on the effects of the virus. I have listed the current situation and will continue to update and keep you informed of any developments.

In the midst of this crisis, I have been heartened and inspired by the kindness that parishioners are showing to each other. The support and pastoral care you are giving to each other highlights to me the strong movement of the Holy Spirit in our midst.

This weekend we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost where we not only reflect on what it means to be Church, but celebrate the unique and powerful presence of the Holy Spirit in our midst.

My prayer is that the Enabling presence of the Holy Spirit be with you all especially over this Pentecost time.

Pentecost

Pentecost is a reminder that, both in our personal lives and society, God does not do everything at once but works in stages.

Pentecost Sunday, this year on 31 May, recalls the time when the Holy Spirit came down on the Church.

It also continues to remind us that, both in our personal lives and society, God does not do everything at once but works in stages. As we move through our time of trial with coronavirus, this aspect of Pentecost may help us.

Pentecost Sunday itself has three layers built into it. In the Scriptures the day occurs on a Jewish feast day. The name of that feast includes the Greek word for 50. The Jewish feast of tabernacles, or in Australian slang lean-tos, celebrated the end of the harvest. It was time to thank God for plenty. It was 50 days after the celebration of Passover, which marked the beginning of harvesting new crops.

All: In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen Gospel

Reader: A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

In the evening of the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you', and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit.

For those whose sins you forgive,

they are forgiven:


for those whose sins you retain,

May they manage the resumption of work with wisdom, confidence and enthusiasm. *Let us pray to the Lord*.



In 20:19-23

The theme of Reconciliation Week (27 May-3 June) this year is *In This Together*. The celebration of the week is likely to be subdued, a victim of the restrictions imposed on us by the Coronavirus.

The 1967 Referendum and the 1992 Mabo case show how far Indigenous Australians have had to come to since the white settlers arrived, and how much more needs to be done. Indigenous Australians would argue that they were never in this together, but were excluded at every turn, receiving as privileges what everybody else enjoyed as rights.

For this reason, it is a tribute to the generosity of spirit of Indigenous communities that the Reconciliation Week slogan is so positive.

An invitation

It invites us to ask what it means to say to our friends or fellow Australians, 'We are in this together'. Easy words, but not so easy to put into practice. In our time of isolation, however, we have vivid images of what it looks like to be in it together in the selfless commitment of doctors, nurses and other medical staff, through the simple ways in which people look after others in need by buying for them, ringing them and in many similar ways.

We have also seen hints of what it means what it looks like to be in it together in government actions. They made it clear that saving lives is more important than making wealth, and have appealed to the common good when putting the restrictions on our freedom that have caused much pain and loss.

This is the kind of thinking and action that Reconciliation Week calls for. It calls on us to acknowledge that indeed we are all in this together, that at many times and in many places we have not previously been so, and that in the future our hearts must change.

Coming to terms

Reconciliation cannot be a papering over of past actions and injuries but the recognition and coming to terms of them. It means acknowledging that the history of our past relationships has been marked by dispossession, violence and discrimination.

It led to inequality and separation, to a world in which Indigenous Australians had little agency. In such conditions people can be in the same room together, but not in any deeper sense be in this together.

If this Reconciliation Week brings us all closer to a shared understanding and empathy about our history and a determination similar to that shown in the response to the Coronavirus, it will have been worthwhile no matter how restricted our celebration of it might be.

Path to reconciliation

For Christians the celebration reminds us of the way that God came to share our life and so to be in this together. It reminds us also of how costly that path was for Jesus and that our path to reconciliation also involves self-sacrifice and going out with empty hands to people who are different from us. If we take this path we shall be with God and in this together.

EUTHANASIA DEBATE

An opinion piece written by Bishop Tim Harris (Diocese of Townsville) around the current euthanasia conversation that is happening in the Queensland Parliament Bishop Tim is the Bishops' spokesperson on this issue.

While all Australians are affected by the COVID-19 virus, as a North Queenslander I am thanking God that we have not been hit as hard as others. And while COVID seems to dominate all we see and hear there is another big issue in Queensland this year in which we will have to interpret what real compassion means. It is about how best to be compassionate to people who are at the end of their lives. There are some who say that the most compassionate thing to do is to allow a person to be assisted by doctors to end their lives when they feel the pain is too hard to bear.



To see a loved one die is a very hard thing indeed. I have made this journey with both my mother and my father and I have felt the pain of seeing those so close to me forced to submit to the frailty of their failing bodies, a journey we will all will have to face.

But I believe it is a misdirected sense of compassion to feel that it is right to actively cooperate in the killing of any human being. Sadly, this misplaced sense of compassion is visible in report of the Parliamentary Committee which was listed on the Parliament's Notice Paper this Wednesday 24 April. The report calls for introduction of assisted suicide laws in Queensland and introduction of a regime with much weaker so called 'safeguards' than present in Victoria where the demand for assisted suicide has surged.

The majority of the Committee do not recommend any time limit in terms of how long a dying person is expected to live before they are eligible for assisted suicide. In practice this means the scheme could include a range of conditions that could ultimately be terminal but may be curable or managed, like diabetes. The Committee also suggested that registered nurses should be able to make the assessment and administer the drug where there are few doctors in remote areas. Persons with episodic mental illness can access the scheme if they have a decision-making capacity, which might include many persons with clinical depression.

We need to listen to the doctors. They want to save lives and not actively seek to take them. Palliative care specialists tell me is that can control pain in 98-99 per cent of all cases. With a good palliative care plan they can effectively eliminate pain and allow dying patients to journey longer with their loved ones leading to a peaceful end. This is real compassion in practice. In North Queensland we have just one palliative care specialist who has to travel large distances to offer specialist palliative care.

However, even if funding benchmarks are met assisted suicide should not be supported. The State should not get involved in this most intimate, most sacred time of our life. Death is not a hopeless point of empty suffering. It is instead a deeply spiritual time for a dying person, who, in approaching death, approaches the fulfilment all they are and have been, breaking through the shadows of this world to a fulfilment of their real life and humanity and dignity in the a new and wondrous dawn "where there will be no more mourning, nor sorrow, nor pain" as the Apostle John writes. And for the families of those dying it too is a special time when they can return to their dying parents in their current vulnerability the love they received as little children in their own vulnerability. The great circle of life, of love, is completed and even though it involves suffering, this suffering has meaning, as it celebrates love with hope. This is a perspective to which our indigenous leaders also appeal.

Only true compassion allows people to die with dignity, a dignity that celebrates every moment of their natural life even unto their last breath.
