### **IMPORTANT COVID-19 UPDATE: Face to Face Masses at St Theresa's Parish**

The St Theresa's CovidSafe plan only allows 108 people in the parish centre following the 4m<sup>2</sup> rule.

On Weekday Masses and Sunday Morning masses, parishioners are to be seated in rows with a red ribbon

On **Saturday Vigil Masses**, parishioners are asked to sit in rows <u>without a red ribbon</u>. Plage lague 2 chairs between households

Please leave 2 chairs between households.

Weekday Masses—no booking required

St Theresa's will be having mass on **Wednesdays and Fridays at 9am.** Wednesday's mass will still be recorded and uploaded on our YouTube channel by 10am.

Parishioners will need to sign a contact's list which we are required to record and keep contact details for 56 days from the day collected.

Hand sanitiser will be provided and as per health directives, please stay home if you are unwell.

### Weekend Masses—booking required

St Theresa's regular weekend masses continue (unless otherwise directed) at 6pm Saturday vigil and 9.30am Sunday morning. Unfortunately, no gathering can occur after mass and parishioners are encouraged to go straight home.

For each weekend, parishioners will need to either purchase a ticket online from Trybooking website, by right clicking on the link or double-clicking on the link provided <u>https://www.trybooking.com/book/event?eid=640220&</u> and choose open link command OR contact the parish by phone 46394688 to register for your preferred mass.

### **Bulletins, Seating and Reception of Communion directives**

Bulletins will continue to be emailed to parishioners now. Communion will only be received via the centre aisle and only under one species. The priest will generally be the sole minister of communion.

# God's reign is like ...'

There is a story of an Indian monk who found the world's largest diamond. In a nearby village a man had a dream that if he went to a certain monastery, he could gain enormous wealth beyond all his hopes. The villager arrived at the monastery and told the monk his dream. The monk explained, 'The dream probably refers to this,' and handed over the diamond to him. The villager returned home with great joy, but that night tossed and turned. The next week he returned to the monastery, utterly exhausted and begged, 'Give me the wealth that enables you to give away this diamond so easily.'

The two parables today remind me of this Indian tale. Jesus says that the reign of God is so great a treasure that it is worth giving up all you have. People who have had profound experiences often struggle to find the words to describe this for others. They find themselves resorting to images – 'It was like ...; it was as if ...'. In the parables Jesus tries to find ways of explaining why the reign of God has so captivated his own imagination. Of course, Jesus speaks of a treasure and a pearl he has already found, while the disciples and later Christians only glimpse God's reign in moments of insight. And yet even these brief and veiled glimpses have been enough to sustain disciples for two thousand years and even today there are many prepared to give all they have in following Christ. These men and women have found the wealth that enabled the monk to give away the diamond.

Paul, whose letter we are currently reading, is an example of one who lived out this parable with utter recklessness. Paul's encounter with the Risen Jesus led him to know the overwhelming love of God is not determined by following the Law but is an utterly gracious gift of God to us. He reflects today, could anything get in the way of this love God has for us; and Paul concludes, there is nothing that can separate us from God's love. This is the treasure that Paul found, enabling him to put aside all the lawful requirements of Judaism he previous-ly thought were the only way to salvation. Paul had once been a Pharisee, one completely dedicated and given over to his Jewish traditions and teaching. Yet, when he comes to know Jesus, he is able to let all this go, to 'hand over the diamond' of his previous life and take up a new calling to spread the Gospel he has now discovered. In the reading from Romans today, it is as if we are listening in to Paul's astonishment at the depths of God's love, a love of us that enabled God to give us Jesus. In a sense, Jesus is God's diamond, given over to us in love. Recognising this enables Paul to give over the diamond of his own life.

The third parable in the collection that Matthew offers picks up the theme of last week's parable about the weeds and the wheat growing together. Today's parable shifts the image from gardening to fishing where the net hauls in a wide catch of both good fish and worthless things. Once again, there will come a time when sorting will happen but not in the middle of the fishing process. Only when the fishing work is over, will the catch be sorted.

When I think of this week's fishing parable and last week's about the wheat and the weeds, I wonder what must have been happening in Matthew's community for him to give his community these two parables, as they are not recorded in Mark and Luke. Were divisions starting to happen? Were people beginning to make judgments about others, perhaps wanting to sort out the community? Could Matthew be trying to teach his local church to leave the sorting out to God? The fact that these are only in Matthew certainly suggests that these had some particular purpose, even if today we can only guess what that might be.
