Gospel Synopsis

For readers of Matthew's gospel, this passage is one of a series of confrontations between Jesus and the religious authorities. His wisdom is tested by the 'so-called' wise, and those who come before him so boldly leave in a state of amazement. The gospel text is one of a series of passages in which Jesus is confronted by those who seek to tarnish his reputation. In each of the troubled meetings, it is the itinerant preacher from Galilee who masters the religious and political elites, whether Scribes, Pharisees, Sadducees or Herodians. The intention to trap Jesus leaves them cornered. As it is becoming clear, these chapters late in Matthew are a prelude to the capture and death of Jesus at the hands of the authorities, an episode where again God thwarts their plans.

Reflection

For Jesus, the money-question was about the power it has over people, how it can be not just a possession but possess us, how it can be tied up with our sense of worth, how it takes over our desires and imagination to such an extent that we do not easily imagine ourselves into the lives of other people and feel empathy for them. The promise of lower taxes pleases many people. There is much public sentiment against paying taxes - especially, when paid to a foreign occupying power as in Jesus' time. Jesus' view is broader. He would not endorse situations or support systems where people just looked after themselves and allowed others to suffer deprivation.

Last week in his latest Encyclical, *Fratelli tutti*, Pope Francis writes, 'If every human being possesses an inalienable dignity, if all people are my brothers and sisters, and if the world truly belongs to everyone, then it matters little whether my neighbour was born in my country or elsewhere. My own country also shares responsibility for his or her development, although it can fulfil that responsibility in a variety of ways. It can offer a generous welcome to those in urgent need, or work to improve living conditions in their native lands by refusing to exploit those countries or to drain them of natural resources, backing corrupt systems that hinder the dignified development of their peoples..... At times, the inability to recognize equal human dignity leads the more developed regions in some countries to think that they can jettison the "dead weight" of poorer regions and so increase their level of consumption' (Pope Francis, Fratelli tutti, #125).

We argue about the borders or limits of compassion expressed in caring for the sick, supporting the aged, providing a liveable wage to people who are unemployed or underemployed, accepting and including people who are different, etc. Geography does not matter when it comes to need for housing or coming from a place where there is no security. Today, we begin Anti-Poverty Week. People failed by their own countries overseas and our country continue to be failed. For some we offer barbed wires and for others no place to safely lay one's head. By putting borders or limitations on our compassion means we may be cutting ourselves off from those who are held close to God's heart and ultimately from God.

Bulletins, Seating and Reception of Communion directives

Bulletins will continue to be emailed to parishioners now. Paper copies can be collected at the end of mass as you are leaving or from the office during the week. If you do not receive an emailed copy of the bulletin and wish to have a bulletin emailed to you each week, please contact the office with your email address. Seating is in any row. Households can sit together with 3 chairs between households. Communion will only be received via the centre aisle and only under one species. The priest will generally be the sole minister of communion. **Weekday Masses—no booking required** St Theresa's will be having mass on **Wednesdays and Fridays at 9am**.

The St Theresa's CovidSafe plan only allows 108 people in the parish centre following the 4m² rule.


